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

MCC will play against Lords and Commons at Lord's on Friday 10 June, the first time that the Home of Cricket has hosted this annual fixture since 12 July, 1939.



James Morris MP, who has played first-class cricket for Oxford University, captains a cross-party Lords & Commons team that also features the Minister for Sport, Hugh Robertson MP, Chief Secretary to the Treasury, Danny Alexander MP and the Shadow Chancellor Ed Balls MP

The match will be followed by a reception in the Long Room, to raise awareness of 'Chance to Shine supported by Brit Insurance', the Cricket Foundation's initiative to reinvigorate state school cricket. Throughout the day, approximately 100 children from Chance to Shine schools will compete in a Kwik Cricket Tournament on the Nursery Ground.

MCC can boast 36 victories in this annual fixture; Lords & Commons eight, with 21 drawn matches. Lords & Commons Cricket Club were last successful in 2003.

VERDI'S MACBETH RETURNS TO THE ROYAL OPERA HOUSE

Phyllida Lloyd's dramatic production of the epic tragedy Macbeth, the first of Verdi's great Shakespearean operas, returns to the Royal Opera House stage this week, for the first time since 2006, with performances on 10, 13 & 15 June at 19.30, and 18 June at 19.00.

This thrilling tale of murder, treachery, greed and insanity unfolds through the powerful designs of Anthony Ward. Macbeth's dagger soliloquy and Lady Macbeth's sleepwalking scene are just two of the play's famous moments brought to life by Verdi's wonderfully atmospheric music.

Singing the title role of Macbeth is British baritone Simon Keenlyside, the first time he has undertaken this role at the Royal Opera House. Ukrainian soprano Liudmyla Monastyrska returns to the Covent Garden stage, following her critically acclaimed performances of Aida, to sing the role of Lady Macbeth.



American tenor Dimitri Pittas makes his Covent Garden debut in the role of Macduff and American bass Raymond Aceto sings the role of Banquo. Antonio Pappano, Music Director of The Royal Opera, conducts all performances.



TOURS OF PARLIAMENT'S PORTCULLIS HOUSE

The stunning architecture of Portcullis House and the unique art collection hung on its walls are highlights of a new 75 minute guided tour of the parliamentary building.

Available, initially, for two days a month from May to July, the tours offer a rare opportunity to view Portcullis House, the only new building commissioned by Parliament since the Palace of Westminster in the 19th century. It was designed by leading British architect Michael Hopkins and officially opened by Her Majesty the Queen in February 2001 providing offices for Members of Parliament and their staff.

Portcullis House is the home of the House of Commons contemporary portrait collection. This unique collection of art, records leading Parliamentarians in paintings, works on paper and photographs. The collection reflects a diversity of styles and approaches by leading UK based artists working over the last 50 years, all the works were commissioned or acquired by the Works of Art Committee.

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A UNIQUE VISITOR VIEW OF LONDON - KAYAK TOURS

London has two sides to its personality, the 'big and bold side', defined by the hustle and bustle of tubes, cabs and crowded streets but little did we know there is a 'sensitive, calm side' to our City which I had the pleasure of exploring recently kayaking on the Hampton Court Tour.

The Hampton Court Tour is situated opposite Hampton Court Palace next to Molesey Lock. It is fun from the start ... just trying to get the buoyancy aid on correctly! First, visitors learn the basic knowledge of how to kayak and manipulate the boats and, more importantly, stay balanced. There is then a safety briefing from an expert British Canoe Union Instructor who, in our case, was the quintessential New Zealander. Dan had a friendly, warm but practical approach.

We waded through 'rollers' which are a type of see-saw lock paddling downstream at Molesey Lock. Having paddled gently along at a steady walking type pace and admired the stately houseboats and English countryside within the urban metropolis, we meandered further downstream, which was relatively easy, towards Ravens Ait, working our muscles and gaining an appetite for our pub lunch. Great exercise for the bingo wings!



This was definitely the best seat in the house in terms of viewing the main attractions without the crowds and queues. It felt like being upgraded from stalls to a private box. Although I was part of a group of 12 participants, my seat was first class the whole way. The Tour is perfect for anyone who wants to play tourist for a day avoiding the chaos for some well-deserved 'R and R'. It is truly a unique way to visit London from a slightly lower level without venturing near the underground!

SILVERSTONE GEARING UP FOR THE ULTIMATE MOTOGP FESTIVAL

The FIM MotoGP World Championship returns to Silverstone on 10–12 June, when Valentino Rossi, Jorge Lorenzo, Casey Stoner and Britain's Cal Crutchlow will go head-tohead with the best riders in the world at the 2011 AirAsia British Grand Prix.

With spectacular on-track action guaranteed, Silverstone has developed a world class line-up of free off-track entertainment, which will run over all three days of the UK's premier motorcycle racing event. The entertainment ranges from stunt shows, concerts and aerobatic displays, to interactive experiences that include off-road riding sessions, pillion rides and 'first-time' taster sessions.

Two interactive zones will run over all three days of MotoGP. New for this year is the Honda Off Road Experiential Zone which will offer Trials riding, an Enduro off-road school and a MotoX off-road school. Whether you're an experienced off-road rider or a complete novice, the Experiential Zone will provide an ideal opportunity to practice and improve your riding skills.

On the Saturday night (11 June), the Honda Off Road Experimental Zone will host a Flat Track Party. A purpose built flat track will stage flat track racing, including the 2011 Pozzani Grand National UK Flat Track Championship series, which will be making its first appearance at Silverstone. The 'Party' will also feature a Big Air Jam Freestyle

competition, rider appearances, including Gratziano Rossi demonstrating his Zaeta Flat Track bike, and the Red Bull DJ truck, ensuring there's something for everyone.

The Get On! Zone at Stowe Circuit will also provide a host of interactive entertainment for fans of all ages – from two year olds to adults. Activities include Kiddi Moto for 2 – 5 year olds, My First Licence for 5 – 11 year olds, Silverstone's Rookie Ride Experience for teenagers aged 13 years or older and Kiddi Quads for children of all ages. For adults there's the Craig Jones Skills School, as well as a Wheelie machine. Stowe Circuit will also feature racing from the Supermoto British Championship.

Elsewhere, the legendary Dougie Lampkin MBE and Craig Jones will be wowing the crowds with regular stunt riding displays, while the Silverstone skies will be busy over the MotoGP weekend with the Red Devils, Red Bull Matadors, and Blades Aerobatic Team performing death-defying air displays on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.



Further entertainment on offer throughout the three-day event includes pillion ride experiences around Stowe Circuit with the California Superbike School; live music, rider interviews and competitions on the Arena Main Stage; interactive and bike displays in the Manufacturer Village; as well as a Funfair featuring rides for all the family.

VERDI REQUIEM AND TCHAIKOVSKY PIANO CONCERTO NO 1



Sir Willard White is one of the most eminent names both in the world's most prestigious opera houses and on the concert platform, and is known to wider audiences through his appearances at the Last Night of the Proms and his hugely popular tributes to Paul Robeson. Susan Gritton, who has established a global reputation and career since winning the Kathleen Ferrier Competition in 1994, has recently worked with Sir Simon Rattle, Sir Colin Davis, and Antonio Pappano in venues from Tokyo to Milan and Sydney to Venice

Ray Davies said: 'I see Birtwistle and Maxwell-Davies as the pioneers of that non-conventional approach and spirit of mischievous British rebellion that influenced so much of my own career. Presenting their works is an opportunity to mark the links between past, present and future in British music.'

THE MERCHANTS OF BOLLYWOOD

The Merchants of Bollywood brings the glamour and glitter of Bollywood back to the West End's Peacock Theatre running until 3 July, following a sell-out international tour and packed houses at the Peacock Theatre last summer.

A theatrical dance extravaganza, The Merchants of Bollywood charts the history of the world's largest and most prolific film industry, and the dynasty of stars that have lit its way over generations. Written and directed by Toby Gough, the show has been seen by over two million people.

RAY DAVIES' MELTDOWN FESTIVAL

Southbank Centre's Meltdown festival 2011, curated by Ray Davies and part of Festival of Britain celebrations, highlights the link between convention-breaking popular music and the iconoclastic side of classical music, as Southbank Centre Resident Orchestra London Sinfonietta performs the works of two of UK's most innovative composers, Sir Harrison Birtwistle and Sir Peter Maxwell-Davies

Rirtwistle and Maxwell-Davies started their careers together as students in Manchester in the mid-1950s. They later teamed-up to form The Pierrot Players (then re-named the Fires of London). writing cutting-edge works for the 1960s. To this phase belongs Maxwell-Davis' Eight Songs for a Mad King, which was premiered in 1969. The monodrama is based on the disconnected words of King George III, who in the later part of his life suffered from a recurrent, and eventually permanent, mental illness. The soliloguy, an extremely demanding part spanning five octaves, will be performed by British baritone Leigh Melrose.

Birtwistle's Virelai and Secret Theatre are also featured in the programme. The first work, premiered in 2008, continues the composer's fascination with ancient music and presents a structure that is inspired by medieval French verse.

Admirers of each other's work, Birtwistle and Ray Davies were both



MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING

I have never seen a production of Shakespeare's Much Ado About Nothing in which the audience seemed programmed for indiscriminate laughter from the moment they walked into the theatre until the moment they walked out.

This, of course, has everything to do with the pairing of Dr Who's David Tennant and Catherine Tate, who, in Josie Rourke's self-consciously rollicking production milk the bantering Benedick and Beatrice for every guffaw they possibly can. From the very outset, the sparring couple go for broke not only on every line Shakespeare gives them, but every syllable as well. Funny voices and facial expressions aren't exactly in short supply either.

Even when laughter isn't called for — as in the heart-stopping moment when Beatrice demands that Benedick 'kill Claudio' after he abandons his bride to be, Hero, at the alter, the audience (at least on the night I was there) fell about laughing.

This cannot be right. In Shakespeare's play of two distinct halves there's time for frivolity and time for solemnity, and

Rourke's take on it, updated to the 1980's and set in a naval base in Gibraltar, too often blurs the contours in its dogged, anything-goes determination to have a laugh.

And while Tennant, who makes his first appearance in a golf trolley dressed in navy whites and dark glasses, is an obvious crowd-pleaser, a little less mugging and gallery playing might give his comic turn an added dimension. A case of less being more.

Subtlety isn't exactly Tate's strong point either. She also believes in the anything-for-a-laugh school of comedy and Rourke's direction clearly encourages this.

The twin scenes — and the comic highlight of the play — in which both Beatrice and Benedick fall prey to a ruse in which they 'accidentally' overhear a conversation that leads them to believe each is in love with the other, are two of the funniest scenes Shakespeare ever wrote.

But they're so broadly and implausibly staged — with Tennant covered in white paint and Tate covered by a decorator's sheet while being harnessed upwards — they play like silent-screen slapstick.

And while updating the action to the permissive 1980's is a shrewd commercial manoeuvre, allowing for a more contemporary music track as well as a pre-nuptial party, whose appurtenances include a sex doll and a sailor stripogram — not to mention some raunchy sex action — it makes no sense whatever in the context of a play whose dramatic fulcrum pivots on whether or not Claudio's intended bride Hero is a chaste virgin!


On a more affirmative note, there are excellent performances from Tom Bateman as Claudio, Sarah Macrae as Hero, John Ramm as Master Constable Dogberry and, best of all, Jonathan Coy as Hero's father Leonato.

This is certainly not the best Much Ado you'll ever see — but it's well geared to the West End in general and fans of its two stars in particular. Notch it up as a commercial success but an artistic failure.

ALBEK DUO AT ST JAMES'S CHURCH PICCADILLY

The dazzling Albek Duo, identical twin sisters from Lugano, Switzerland, have been captivating audiences throughout Europe, North and South America and Australia. And now, Ambra (violin, viola) and Fiona (piano) will be making their first appearance in London at St. James's Church, Piccadilly on Thursday. 16 June at 19.30.

Reviewers have been lavish in their praise of Ambra and Fiona's high level of musicianship and their ability to charm audiences and communicate the sheer joy of music-making. As one critic wrote: 'The enchanting and delightful performance by the Albek twins was full of grace, bravura and originality in a demanding program. These sisters from Switzerland from the very beginning have captured the public's attention with their spontaneous freshness and interesting program choices.'

Their programme at St. James's Piccadilly includes colorful music by Joaquín Turina, sonatas by Leoš Janáček and Edvard Grieg, and the Romanian Folk Dances of Béla Bartók in a rare arrangement for viola and piano edited by the composer's son. The concert also features the UK premieres of two pieces specially composed for the Albek Duo: The Nightingale in the Park by American composer William Perry and Alessandro Lucchetti's Fantasy on Themes from Puccini's Tosca.

Some of this music appears on the Albek Duo's recent and widely-praised Eroica CD called 'South of the Alps,' presenting music from Italy, France and Spain. In August, Naxos Records will release their performance of the Gemini Concerto, another piece written for them by William Perry and recorded with the RTÈ National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland.

Duruflé's Requiem is deservedly one of the most popular choral works of the twentieth century. Rooted in Gregorian chant, it creates a timeless, mystic soundworld of intense luminosity. Like Fauré, Duruflé rejected the hellfire and brimstone model of the Requiem Mass and preferred instead a more contemplative, ethereal evocation, Richly varied choral and orchestral writing is

illuminated by moments of intense drama and the eloquent mezzo-soprano solo in the Pie Jesu.

Duruflé's exact contemporary Herbert Howells also drew inspiration from the church in which he worked. His writing owes much, not just to the Tudor predecessors he so admired, but to the very architecture of the English cathedral and the effect of voices in resonant spaces.

The music finds a perfect setting in St. John's, Smith Square on Thursday 23 June (19.30). Situated in the heart of Westminster. St John's is one of London's major concert venues and favourite historic buildings, famed for its superb

acoustic. Built in 1728, and restored after damage in the Second World War, it is one of the finest examples of English Baroque architecture and is considered a masterpiece of this style.

Conductor Hilary Davan Wetton brings together again the City of London Choir - 'a leader among nonprofessional choruses' (Times) - with the 'superb' London Mozart Players (Independent). They will be joined by organist Mark Williams, currently Director of Music at Jesus College Cambridge, described by the international press as 'nothing short of brilliant' and 'the shooting star of the international organ scene'. The mezzosoprano soloist will be emerging talent Marta Fontanals-Simmons: '... an intense, expressive and attractive voice which reminded me keenly of Susan Gritton's' (BBC Music Magazine).

This will be a concert to nurture the soul.

Following their scene-stealing performance at the Royal Wedding, the Central Band of the Royal Air Force performs the music of Coates. Frnest Tomlinson, and other wind band favourites from the light music repertoire. A unique and prized British tradition rooted in village, church and military, the brass band movement was a response to industrialisation and reached its peak in the early twentieth century when over 20,000 players were estimated to play in brass bands in the UK.

BONHAMS SELL GLASS REPUTED TO HAVE BELONGED TO NAPOLEON

A wine glass that is thought to have belonged to Napoleon Bonaparte is to be part of the auction of Fine British and European Glass and Paperweights on 15 June at Bonhams, New Bond Street.

The glass is offered in a red-leather coated wooden case with gilded toolwork, and attached to the case is a handwritten note that reads Wine Glafs of 1st Emperor Napoleon given to James C.Fyler Esqr. by the Count Strasoldo Governor of Elba in 1818 A.D. It is unusual for a liquer glass to be encased in such a fine manner, strongly suggesting that the owner may have been a senior military commander on campaign.

In 1814, Napoleon was exiled to the Italian island of Elba following his abdication at Fontainbleau and he lived in a house that was subsequently inhabited by the Governor of the island. In 1817, James Chamness Fyler (1790–1858), to whom the label on the glass case is thought to refer, visited the island with his friend John Singleton as part of their Grand Tour travels around Europe.



On the letter attached to the case it refers to Count Strasoldo as the Governor of Elba, however, Giulio Giuseppe di Strassoldo von Graffenberg (1771-1830) was actually in Milan at this time serving as the representative of the Holy Roman Empire. After leaving Elba, Singleton and Fyler continued travelling around Italy before returning to England, and so it is possible that Fyler acquired the glass either whilst visiting Elba or from elsewhere in Italy through a meeting with Strassoldo.

KENNINGTON: PORTRAITS OF THE BRITISH AT WAR

The Royal Air Force Museum London is to celebrate the re-opening of its Art Gallery to the public on Friday 10 June with the installation of an exhibition of portraits by renowned wartime artist Eric Kennington. The guest curator of the exhibition is the Senior Research Fellow in History of Art at Kingston University, Jonathan Black, who has mounted two other shows about Kennington in the last decade.

For much of his distinguished career, Kennington was counted amongst the ranks of exceptional portraitists such as: Hans Holbein the Younger; Albrecht Dürer; Franz Hals; Van Gogh and Augustus John. Many of his artistic contemporaries rated him as the finest draughtsman of his day, while he enjoyed the admiration of prominent public figures such as Winston Churchill, George Bernard Shaw and T.E. Lawrence.

The exhibition will present about three dozen works covering all of the Armed Services, the Auxiliary Services, London Transport and some notable civilians.

Kennington was among a handful of British artists who distinguished themselves as official war artists in both World Wars. His portraits were widely hailed not only as works of art, but also as capturing the indomitable spirit of British and Allied Servicemen in the struggle for victory.

This exhibition, the first to focus specifically on his Second World War Art, seeks to re-assess Kennington's significant contribution to British War Art and to acknowledge his undoubted standing as one of the great British portraitists of the Twentieth Century. In a 'People's War', he produced unforgettable images of ordinary men and women who displayed extraordinary courage and resilience under exceptional circumstances.

At least as striking as their architecture are the Yemenis themselves, hospitable and cultured, maintaining strong traditions that lend soul and authenticity to Yemen's ancient culture.

ONE MAN, TWO GUVNORS

National Theatre

If the thought of Commedia dell'Arte, with its silly servants and gratuitous slapstick, its bosoms and buffoonery, makes you groan, think again. Richard Bean, one of our most talented and certainly funniest working playwrights, has re-worked Goldoni's 'The Servant of Two Masters' into a 1960s seaside romp. The result will make you gasp with delight.

Centre stage is James Corden as porcine underling, Henshall, whose obsession with food is only trumped by the base ambition to 'get his leg over'. Henshall arrives in Brighton as the supposedly menacing minder of one of the Crabbe twins (any similarity to the Krays wholly understandable), but it is hard to take him seriously when his deadliest trick is to catch peanuts thrown up in the air, even if that means falling over backwards in an armchair. He is not what he seems - nor is his diminutive boss, who turns out to be the dead twin's sister in disguise - and when he is simultaneously hired by the girl's boyfriend, Henshall's fate as the duplicitous servant of two masters is sealed.

Corden is a revelation in this role, revealing himself as chubby athlete, competent musician and master of improvisation. He chases, he cajoles, he squirms in confusion and in between acts he plays the xylophone alongside a cheerful Beatles-style quartet called The Craze. Members of the audience are press-ganged into assisting him with his food thefts (beware sitting in the front row unless you enjoy fetching and

carrying and being roughly bundled into hiding on set), their humiliation providing more hilarity for the rest of us.

But 'One Man...' is by no means a star vehicle. Bean has written some brilliantly comic characters, including Alan Dangle (Daniel Rigby) a would-be thespian who woos his dim fiancée with lines from Shakespeare delivered sideways-on, in strangulated, sub-Olivier tones. The traditional bawdy wench is here a book keeper with feminist leanings, whose physical presence is uncannily like that of Barbara Windsor in the Carry On films, but whose intellect presages a female prime minister at Number Ten 'one day' who will embrace the poor and put an end to foreign wars...

Oliver Chris is excellent as the second master, a tall toff called Stanley Stubbers whose role is to exemplify boarding school brutality got up as middle class manners. Finally, the award for best clown goes to Tom Edden as Alfie, an octogenarian waiter who is able to punctuate violent shaking of crockery

with falling fifteen feet downstairs, a cartoon character who is regularly flattened behind opening doors, only to stagger on again.

Nicholas Hytner and Cal McCrystal direct the action at breakneck speed, so that there is hardly a moment to catch your breath between gales of laughter. This is possibly the best comedy ever staged at the National.



RESTAURANT CHEZ GERARD SPRING MENU

I have to declare an earlier interest in restaurants Chez Gerard – I'm a long time fan of these chic Gallic eateries serving the real classics. From the eternal soupe a l'oignon, escargots and fois gras to their famous steak frites and boeuf bourgignon, confit de canard, moules marinieres and a superb tartiflette, this is authentic French cooking at its very best.

The favourites are augmented by daily specials. Plats du jour on the day I had lunch were grilled rib eye steak served with wild mushroom sauce or, for fish, king prawns and king scallops served with red pepper sauce and leek mash. The starter choice was mushroom soup or grilled duck breast salad with green beans and mixed leaves, tasty strips of rich duck yet a pleasingly light appetiser.

My companion pronounced the scallops perfectly cooked and pretty as a picture on the plate with a sprinkling of pomegranate seeds and marinaded cauliflower florets. The magret de canard main dish was perfectly pink breast of duck accompanied by celeriac mash and honey roasted pear in a red wine jus. Absolutely delicious.

Cheese is traditionally taken before pudding in France, here it's a feast of regional dairy delights in every shape and size. After two leisurely courses, dessert seemed a struggle until we spied another classic – tarte au citron, understated, zesty, the ideal foil to the savouries

We drank a recommended and eminently drinkable Beaujolais right through the meal which accompanied the duck well but didn't overwhelm the subtlety of the scallops.

Chez Gerard Charlotte Street is in the midst of the media world, good for Oxford Street shoppers and just a stone's throw from the British Museum, while the Dover Street restaurant enjoys a central location for the art galleries in and around Cork Street, close to the Park Lane and Piccadilly hotels and for visitors to Buckingham Palace.

As part of the new look, feel and taste of Chez Gerard, the new prix fixe menu is now available at not only the Charlotte Street restaurant, but at all eight locations across the capital.

It features new lighter dishes which are perfect for summer dining, whether you are looking for a three course meal, or a light, quick bite. The Salade au Saumon Fume and the Supreme de Volaille Farci aux Champignons are already proving popular, especially when teamed with a tempting starter or mouthwatering dessert.

Don't be mistaken into thinking that Chez Gerard has changed, it hasn't. It's just getting better and better!
